

STEP BY STEP

- Title page & Mind Map
- Mood Board (optional)
- Artist Research what do you think of their work how will you use the ideas.
- Initial Ideas from the artist's work mind map, drawings from the artist's work/notes
- Experiment with different ideas, materials and techniques.
- Selecting your best ideas and writing why you chose these.
- Developed ideas for final piece at least 3
- Final piece

(You may find it useful to tick off each stage as you complete it)

STARTING POINT CONTEXT (A01)

Create a Title Page:

- Generate some ideas for a title page.
- Link your background and title style to the theme of the question.
- The title page should include the question.
- It can be over two pages if your choose so.
- Remember good presentation is vital.

• From here on in each page should be a piece of work in itself.

PRESENTING YOUR TITLE PAGE

How do you want to present your work?

- Think about your strengths.
- Are they painting, drawing, collage etc.
- What ideas can you find on the internet, in art books, in magazines.



Developing & Exploring your ideas (A01)


To be successful:

- I will design my mind map in the theme of the question.
- I will lay out my ideas roughly first.
- I will include descriptive words, keywords and phrases relating to the question.
- I will include and link images, illustrations in my presentation.

Creating a Mind Map











MIND MAP IDEAS
















EXPLORING AND RESEARCHING A01

To be successful:

- You will research the minimum of two artists.
- The first artist will be from the question.
- Your second artist will of your choice, interested in and link to the theme/question.
- You will present pages on these artists, images of their work and write about their work and background.
- You will explain how the artists link to the question/theme, like the theme, style or techniques because they are interesting and want to apply them in your work.
- You will include images and draw examples of their work.
- You will use the art history writing guide sheet. Be general.



Development is important because...


- It allows you to explore different ideas.

4. Your opinion about your work- 'I like the detail that I have added here, I want to develop this more in my next drawing'




A title that explains what you are developing

GCSE ART HISTORY QUICK GUIDE

STEP 1: History: Research the artist's background information.	STEP 2: Description: Describe this piece in as much detail as you can. Leave nothing out.	Step 3: Analysis: Describe the work.	Step 4: Interpretation: Explain your view about the piece of work.	Step 5: Judgement: Explain your point of view about the piece of work; the strengths and weaknesses.
Who is the artist?	What do you see? List everything you can see in the piece of work.	Describe the visual elements the artist has used in their work: Line, tone, colour, shape etc?	Write at least one clear sentence describing what the artwork is about?	List 3-10 things you like about the work. Explain why using your first impressions.
What type of art work does the artist make?	Describe the materials and techniques the artist uses.	How has it been composed?	Describe the feel, mood or message in the work?	Explain why you chose this artists work.
What art movement is the artist associated with?	Can you add anything else?	What is the style of the work?	Can you add anything else?	How does their work link to your exam?

Can you link this work to other artists you have studied.

Write your notes into an short essay

Remember to present the work of the artist you are describing.

Punctuation

- Full stop Marks the end of a sentence.
- , Comma Separates items in a list or clauses in a complex sentence.
- Apostrophe Shows belonging or missing letters in words like don't and can't.
- "Inverted commas Show quotation.
- Question mark Ends a question sentence.
- : Colon Joins two related clauses where one clause cannot stand alone.
- Semicolon Joins two equal clauses that are closely related but could also stand alone.

- ☐ Have I used an appropriate style with no slang or informal language?

Reading, Writing and Communication in Art

MY INITIAL IDEAS (A03)

To be successful:

- You will write about you initial ideas and research. Even though you may change your ideas later.
- At this stage you don't need to be very specific. Keep it general.
- You will prepare your background in the theme of **your project**.









FOR EXAMPLE WRITE:

My Initial Ideas.

I want to discover more about the subject of FOOD. The theme I have chosen is sweets but I do like other aspects of food too like junk food vs healthy food. My influencing artists are Sarah Graham, Wayne Thiebaud as well as a few others. I chosen this topic because I like the colours, shapes and detail of sweets.

I want to record directly using photography and drawing from a range of sweets. I want to explore different angles and arrangements to produce interesting compositions as a starting point. From here I would like to experiment with a range of materials and techniques to see what effects I can achieve.



RECORDING FROM DIRECT OBSERVATION (A02 &A03)

To be successful:

- You will do several pages of observations that link to your theme and annotate your work.
- Your observations can be a mix of photographs and drawings.
- Your recorded observations can be linked to the artists style and techniques you are studying as part of your experiments.



TO EXPERIMENT AND DEVELOP IDEAS FROM PRIMARY SOURCES (A02 & A03)

EXPERIMENT WITH DIFFERENT IDEAS, MATERIALS & TECHNIQUES

To be successful write and do:

- My next step is to experiment and develop my ideas based on my drawings and photographs.
- I will explore and experiment in a similar style of the artists I have research.
- I will create small examples in the similar to the work of Artists' like:



To be successful:

- I will select a few of the best ideas I have produced so far.
- I will explain what I aiming to do for my final piece.
- I will show how my ideas have changed form the start of the project.



REFINING MY FINAL IDEA (A02 & A03)

To be successful:

- I will select one idea.
- I will further experiment with different ways to create my final piece.
 - For example: If you are creating a painting, a drawing or a sculpture, you need to plan at least 2 ideas on a small scale.
- I will make notes about how I think it can make the ideas work.
- I will try different techniques before making my final choice.
 - If you are doing a sculpture try making a section of the sculpture using different materials like cardboard or willow to find out what is most successful.
- I will evaluate my strengths, weaknesses and next steps when experimenting.
- You can photograph your progress as well.

DO YOU NEED TO FURTHER REFINE YOUR IDEA?

If you have changed you mind after doing your experiments, you need to include a page explaining why and how, showing your new idea with any new photographs you intend to work from.

MY FINAL IDEA (A03 & A04)

To be successful:

- My book will contain the final prep.
- I will explain exactly what I plan to do for your final piece in detail.
- I will show how this links back to the artists work I researched.
- I will attempt some small sections of my final piece to make sure it works by testing materials, include examples, planning the scale of your work, explaining and evaluating my progress.

• Be specific and describe as well as illustrate exactly what you need to do. This is your chance to think through what you want to do without pressure!

EVALUATE YOUR FINAL PIECE A04

To be successful:

- Describe what you did in your final piece.
 - What you made and how you made it, describing materials and techniques.
 - Is there a clear link to the artist(s) you studied? Why and how?
 - If possible show the stages of making it, if you have enough time left.



- **S** = What was successful, what you liked and why?
- **W** = What were your weaknesses, what you could improve your work and why?
- NS = What have you learnt from this experience? Do you think you were prepared? How do you think you could have improved your outcome?
